Reflection – small beginnings

On Thursday a work party started the job of removing the sickly box hedges from St. Mary's churchyard. It was hard work but we enjoyed each others company, the fresh air, exercise and a refreshment break mid morning. We discovered that a chest tomb can make a useful table from which to consume our drinks and cakes! As we enjoyed our break a gentleman strolled past, then doubled back and introduced himself.

Church wasn't his thing but we got chatting, he was at a loose end and he was soon at work helping with the moving of hedge cuttings. Details were exchanged with the promise to let him know that date of the next work party. Will anything more come of it? Who knows, but any enterprise has to start somewhere, and often that is in a small way.

We get this feeling of things that start small becoming big in the parable of the mustard seed (Matthew 13 v31-32). It is the smallest of all the seeds (apparently). But someone nevertheless has the faith and takes the trouble to plant and tend it. Then it grows into a shrub and then a tree and is useful, especially if you happen to be a bird in search of a place to build a nest... where eggs are laid and hatched and more growth...you get the idea.

Jesus was teaching that these small beginnings of planting a tiny mustard seed are like the Kingdom of Heaven. So the Kingdom of Heaven (or God, it's interchangeable) starts small but has the potential to grow

big. How we need to remember that when we feel small and not much use and that we can't make a difference. It's as if those very things that we so easily take to be a big negative are in fact a big positive. They are a gracious invitation to grow the kingdom by doing what we can do- the small things ... and leave the rest to God.

But things growing from small beginnings can happen in undesirable ways too. Towards the end of last year a virus that had confined itself to the animal kingdom 'worked out' how to jump species and managed to infect a single human being. Now look at where we are. We need to be careful and remember that small bad can grow big too. What 'rabbits' have we set running that we later wished we hadn't?!

As we crawl nervously out of lockdown it is almost as if we feel diminished. People have lost their lives. Church budgets are bashed. National debt soaring. Jobs gone or at risk. Can we trust enough to begin again with the small 'kingdom' things that we can do and see where that takes us? Rev'd Clive
